Miranda was rescued on 29 November 2014 from a large scale backyard breeding situation. A total of 73 guinea pigs were rescued, but Miranda's condition is definitely the worst. Miranda arrived with a severely broken and infected back leg, covered in mange, and possibly pregnant. She was in pain and was quickly taken to the Albany Creek Veterinary Surgery for treatment.

Miranda has since had her leg amputated and is in a bandage full time to protect her skin, as well as stop her from continuing to scratch. She's on pain medication and antibiotics as well as having products applied directly to her skin.

# A little about you...

I am a high school teacher at an all boys' Catholic college. Despite its challenges, I really love my job!

I currently have nine of my own guinea pigs including my beautiful, blind girl Sugar (pictured). They are all rescue pigs or babies born on foster care.



How did you become a piggy volunteer and foster parent?

I had guinea pigs for a number of years before I moved to Brisbane. When one of my older piggies became ill, our vet recommended a local shelter to find a friend for her. After a while, I became a foster carer and volunteer. It didn't take long for me to fall in love with many of my foster pigs!

#### Most memorable piggie moment?

Over the years I have fostered many guinea pigs through various pregnancies. While that seems like a great experience, it can also be very hard. Guinea pigs who are on second or third (or more) back-to-back pregnancies are at extreme risk. We have gone through two emergency caesareans and unfortunately a few stillbirths. I have spent some many hours watching pregnant pigs for signs of labour, but have always just missed out on seeing the actual birth.

# What is something people may not know about guinea pigs?

Guinea pigs are very different to cats and dogs to treat. They are actually classed as exotic pets. Because of this, when your piggie needs medical attention, it is always best to see an exotics vet who specialises in guinea pigs.

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## **Medical Facts**

## **Barbering**

Barbering is a condition in which a guinea pig loses hair due to fur-chewing, either by the pig itself or by a fellow guinea pig. Barbering may be a result of boredom, lack of hay, stress, or other unknown factors.

Sometimes barbering can by reduced by giving your guinea pigs more hay or providing it with safe toys like toilet rolls filled with hay or tunnels, etc. In other cases it can be very hard to cure and is just a habit of the offending guinea pig. Barbering doesn't hurt the guinea pig being barbered or the offending guinea pig.



# **Piggie Food Facts**

#### **Broccoli**

Broccoli is a great treat for your piggies. It is extremely high in vitamin C, which is important for piggies as they cannot produce their own. It is also very high in vitamin K which is essential for building strong bones.



Broccoli contains 24 important vitamins and minerals, all of which help with the health of your piggies. The leaves contain vitamin A and can also be fed to your piggies. Broccoli should only be given one to two times a week, and in small amounts, as it can cause gas or bloating.
